

SKYMONT SCOUT RESERVATION



CELEBRATING 100 YEARS OF ORGANIZED SCOUTING IN SOUTHEAST TENNESSEE AND NORTHWEST GEORGIA

THE START OF SCOUTING IN CHATTANOOGA

After the National Boy Scouts of America was founded in 1910, several Chattanooga area businessmen began discussing how Scouting could benefit youth in our area and teach them positive character traits, leadership skills, patriotism, business and trade skills and the value of giving back to their community through service. This group included influential community leaders, such as Mayor T.C. Thompson, John A. Patten, Walter C. Johnson, Judges Martin Fleming and S.D. McReynolds, William E. Brock, and Major Fred H. Phillips.

The leadership of these and many other volunteers has produced a tremendous impact in the lives of hundreds of thousands of youth over the past century. Your involvement and support will also positively influence thousands of youth this year and many more in the future.

1915

Scouts assist with Memorial Day at Chattanooga National Cemetery.

First summer camp held at Boulder Nook, near Falling Water.

1914

Chattanooga Council, BSA charters with thirteen Troops and more than 200 boys and quickly expands to include Troops throughout Southeast Tennessee and Northwest Georgia.

1919

20 Scouts recognized for attaining the Eagle Scout rank.

1922

Chattanooga Council aids in establishment of the Chattanooga Community Chest (United Way of Greater Chattanooga) with a purpose to "strengthen and make effective the spirit of human helpfulness in Chattanooga, to give citizens the opportunity to help with human welfare, and to coordinate the work of benevolent and charitable institutions of Chattanooga".

1926

Camp Tsatanugi, on Boy Scout Road in Hixson, opens and will serve as the Council's primary camp for the next quarter-century. The John A. Patten dining hall still stands today.

The 100th young man attains the Eagle Scout rank.

1927

James L. Jenkins hired as a Scout Field Executive, the first African American Executive in the nation.

1930

Cub Scouting, a home and neighborhood-centered program, added for younger boys.

1938

Cherokee Area Council helps establish the Cleveland Community Chest (United Way of Bradley County) to collectively raise monies to benefit local community projects.

1939

Fifteen year old Boy Scout Carey Hanlin chosen to serve as President (for the day) of Provident Insurance Company during Boys' Day. As an adult, he rose to the actual position of President and CEO of Provident and served as Council President in 1981-82.

1952

Camp Cherokee opens on Parkville Lake and will serve as the Council's primary camp until 1973.

1957

Installation of the Order of the Arrow Talidandaganu' Lodge 293, a Scout Honor Service Corps.



Scouts have assisted with Memorial Day services at the Chattanooga National Cemetery for 99 years.

1964

The 1000th young man attains the Eagle Scout rank.

1974

First summer camps conducted at Skymont Scout Reservation with over 2,400 acres available for year-round Scout camping.

2004

Lee S. Anderson (Eagle Scout class of 1939)

recognized as a BSA National Distinguished Eagle Scout Award recipient.

2010

100th Anniversary of Boy Scouts of America. A public Scout Show is conducted at Coolidge Park.

2011

Tom Edd Wilson (Eagle Scout class of 1955) recognized as a National Distinguished Eagle Scout Award recipient in a presentation by National BSA Chief Scout Executive Bob Mazza.
